Paul's Epistle

This month looks to be an opportunity for us to do a couple things that are important to the ongoing life and health of our Congregation.

In every conversation I have had recently, with Pastoral groups around the nation, the question of what will happen "after the pandemic" comes up. Will people return, will our Worship and Community life be the same?

These would be difficult questions if this happened any time, but the concerns are exacerbated by the realities of the past decades. Amanda Marcotte (senior politics writer for Salon) writes: "Americans are losing their religion. Over the past 22 years the number of Americans who say they belong to a church, synagogue or mosque has fallen to 47 percent down from 70 percent in 1999." Considering that even 1999. Religious Institutions had experienced

significant declines from previous decades, the increase in the pace of decline and influence is startling. When we add the reality that we are a congregation that has experienced serious decline in just the last decade, it can create quite justified concern for us.

Although it would understandable if we were to throw up our hands and give up on the prospects of a return to vitality against such overwhelming odds, that is not the way of God. The Israelites suffering under slavery in Egypt had no reasonable chance to escape, yet with God, it happened. Paul, an enemy of the early Christians, devoted to their destruction, could never become the greatest evangelist the Church has seen, and yet, with God, it happened. Little David could never defeat the giant Goliath, wrest the crown from Saul nor overcome his personal demons to become a leader guided by honor, and yet, with God, he did.

This month we will be focused on the words Jesus spoke as recorded in

Support for Julius Muthengi's Ministry

In last month's
Vineyard we
printed a letter
from Julius
Muthengi which
described the
need for help with
providing

electricity to run a water pump.
Recognizing that help was needed immediately, Council voted to send \$500 from our Hope Fund. Part of the reply we got - "Thank you so much for your partnership with us in God's ministry here in Kenya. As you are aware, sometime back, we wrote to you regarding the need to have solar power installed so that we could continue providing fresh water to our

community. Indeed, in the last couple of months we have faced insurmountable challenges due to inability to pump the much-needed water! Yes, we got some funds towards this project but not enough to meet the amount needed for the project. We praise God that he led you to come to our rescue. . . Thank you so much for your donation of \$500."

We have since received word that the needed money was obtained and the project is under way! But costs of maintaining the pump and solar panels continue, so throughout May we will be accepting contributions to support the Muthengi's ministry. If you use offering envelopes, note your donation on the "Special" line. If you give through Givelify, choose "Julius Muthengi Ministry."

Many already know the story of our connection to the Muthengis, but if you are interested in some background ——-read on!

Rev. Julius Muthengi and his wife Agnes first came to Myerstown in 1978 to attend and graduate from the EC Theological Seminary. Julius is now a professor at International Leadership University in Nairobi, Kenya, educating Christian leaders for ministries in Africa, and he and Agnes maintain an active ministry to a village about 35 miles outside the city.

Julius has come back to the US a number of times to speak at churches and gain financial support. In fact, he was scheduled to speak here last summer but his trip was canceled due to Covid. He has used this support to provide solar lamps, food for the villagers, school fees and uniforms for needy children, and to arrange for medical care from volunteer doctors who provide

free checkups for people. Several years ago we contributed money for solar lamps, which cost about \$40 each and provide light for up to 8 hours a day. Most families have no electricity, and kerosene costs \$3-\$4 a week. The average salary is about \$1 per day.

In 2015, we, along with other churches, donated money to help dig a well in Julius's village of Kalima Kathei, which has a population of over 2,000, with approximately 250-300 households. Most residents there depend on subsistence farming for their livelihood. They experience frequent crop failure due to the hot, dry climate. Before the well was dug, the community lacked adequate water sources. They had to use an unsanitary watering hole on private land that was used by both humans and animals. During the dry season, the hole would dry up and people had to pay for water.

Agnes travels to the village a few days each week, where she leads a Christian Women's Fellowship Group, providing the ladies with a full meal at each meeting and sending snacks home to the children. With donations from

churches, she has also provided Bibles in the local language, packages of food several times a year, over-the -counter medicines as needed, small loans, and small grants for health care needs. Julius returns to the village at least once or twice a month for his Men's Ministry. Providing Julius and Agnes with financial support is a great way to spread the Good News of Christ's love.
